HISTORY OF COOPERATIVE EDUCATION JUNE, 2018

- Late 1800's the Industrial Revolution was underway with new innovations and technologies creating a demand for specialized knowledge and training in the workplace.
- The Morrill Act of 1862 (Land Grant Act) provided funds to establish colleges devoted to agriculture and mechanical arts.

First time government became involved in support of higher education

Education had been concentrated in classical arts, Land grant schools allowed students to develop practical skills that could be applied in work settings

HERMAN SCHNEIDER UNIVERSITY OF CINCINNATI

1872

Herman Schneider, co-op founder, is born in Summit Hill, PA

1903

He came to Cincinnati, was offered position as engineering instructor.

1906

Became Dean of UC College of Engineering

Proposed a structured method of combining academic education and practical work experience.

(M.B. Reilly 2006)

"Let him go ahead. Nothing he can do will harm that department."

"We hereby grant the right to Dean Schneider to try, for one year, this cooperative idea of education... (for) the failure of which, we will not assume responsibility."

(M.B. Reilly 2006)

FIRST CLASS

- Originally alternating work and school weekly.
- First co-op class had 27 students and 13 companies.
- First wages in 1906 were 8-10 cents an hour.

NORTHEASTERN UNIVERSITY

1909 Day School of Cooperative Engineering of Polytechnic Institute of the YMCA starts co-op program with 8 students and 4 employers with Hercules Germanos, named Dean of College and Director of Cooperative Program.

First Co-op marketing slogan developed – "Earning While Learning."

1912 First co-op reflection activity – required co-op work reports.

- 1914 University of Akron
- 1915 University of Cincinnati Nursing
- 1919 General Motors Institute was the first 100% mandatory co-op program that was owned and operated by a corporation, championed by Charles F. Kettering (now named Kettering University)

Drexel University

1920 Ohio Mechanics Institute

Antioch developed liberal Arts Co-op

First women co-op at the University of Cincinnati

UNIVERSITY OF WATERLOO

1957 First co-op program in Canada, now the largest program in the world.

Began with 74 engineering students

21,500 students enrolled in co-op

60 different countries

Last year processed over 1 million student job applications

Over 1,700 interviews held on one day

THEORY

- Colleges responded with new courses of study practical education – education for a specific field now became acceptable.
- The philosophical foundation for cooperative education was also taking place.
- John Dewey wrote Experience and Education (1938)

"There is an intimate and necessary relation between the process or actual experience and education." Dewey believed that people learned from experience and doing.

CO-OP PROFESSIONAL ASSOCIATIONS/ORGANIZATIONS

- 1926 Association of Cooperative Colleges -first professional association for cooperative education – First meeting at the University of Cincinnati – Herman Schneider elected President.
- 1929 Division of the Society of Promotion of Engineering Education (later ASEE) – became the Cooperative Education Division (CED) of the American Society of Engineering Education – changed to Cooperative and Experiential Education Division (CEED) in 2009.
- 1956 National Commission for Cooperative Education founded to promote Co-op and raise funds

CEA/CEIA

1963 The Cooperative Education Association is established with Don Hunt and Frank Jakes taking the lead to represent the interests and promote the expansion of co-op, especially in non-engineering disciplines.

> Northeastern University received a Ford Foundation Grant to establish the first co-op training center to help develop new coop programs.

1964 CEA held its first annual conference in Detroit, Michigan Research in the field of Cooperative Education became a key element to demonstrating the success of programs and the Journal of Cooperative Education was established.

1965 Title VIII of the Higher Education Act

Provided more funding toward growth of co-op programs

Assisted with expansion to business, health and liberal arts

- 1969 Cincinnati State and Technical College first two-year school with mandatory co-op
- **1971** National Conference on Cooperative Education
- **1979** First World Conference on Cooperative Education
- 1983 WACE established
- 1985 National Ad Campaign

- Internship is added to CEA making the organization new name CEIA (late 1990's)
- The National Academy of Work-Integrated Learning (NAWIL) of CEIA is founded to provide professional training to co-op and internship practitioners. (now named the CEIA Academy)
- Today, approximately 1000 colleges and universities in 43 countries, with 76,000 employers and 310,000 students participating annually in co-op partnerships
